Library and overdue books

Overdue Library book notices are attached to this newsletter for students who have not returned books. Reminders have previously been sent out for some students and failure to return a library book or returning a damaged or destroyed book will incur an invoice. Invoices will be sent home next week requesting the costs be provided to allow the school to source a replacement book for our Library. Students will not be allowed borrow until the overdue book is returned or the invoice paid.



Being SunSafe and SunSmart



Even when the sun isn't shining brightly we are still affected by UV rays and exposure to skin damage. UV levels are high enough at UV3 or above to damage unprotected skin most months of the year and can be present even on cool and cloudy days. This means sun protection may be needed even when the sun is not visible.

The UV index is a scale from 1 (low) to 11+ (extreme) usually peaking between 11.00am and 3.00pm during daylight savings. We can't see UV so we need to protect ourselves with brimmed hats, wearing sun protective clothing and sunscreen on exposed skin, wearing sunglasses and finding shade whenever possible to minimise exposure.

Spring Terrace continually reminds students to wear their hats when outdoors and reinforces the 'No Hat – No Play' policy. As we get closer to 'Summer' if it ever stops raining we might see more sunshine.
